Message from Managing Director Anna Cerneaz

Artology in 2014 has seen much joy and creativity driven by Artistic Directors Murray Dahm (WotOpera) and Lyle Chan (Artology Remix).

Artology's flagship program WotOpera ran eight High School programs incorporating over 30 schools across Australia plus the annual Camp.

We continued to align WotOpera more closely with the education curriculum in the eastern states while our strong relationship with the University of Tasmania saw increasing numbers of credits awarded towards a Bachelor of Musical Arts.



Both the University of Sydney and Melbourne continued their research projects into the positive impacts on participating students.

In 2014, Artology Remix presented its second program in association with OperaQ. The inaugural Remix project in 2013 was lead by Catherine Milliken following her Discovery Program with the Berlin Philharmonic.

This year Remix was lead artistically by composer Lyle Chan in conjunction with OperaQ. Young artists were mentored by professionals in re-developing a masterpiece into a multi-artform performance. The project saw the young artists and genre leaders challenged beyond their expectations with a spectacular result at OperaQ in October.

Fanfare was introduced in 2014 as a collaboration between the Australian Youth Orchestra, Artology and the Sydney Opera House. Launched in March with a national call for submissions, we received over 120 submissions from budding composers aged from 12 to 21. The goal was to replace the 'ding dong' cue bells at SOH with short and original fanfares, thus showcasing the talent of young composers.

The eight winning composers completed a series of workshops with the Australian Youth Orchestra and renowned Australian composer Nicholas Vine.

The Artology team has grown in number and skill! Peter Aoun was employed as WotOpera's Music Director, Bridget Elliot took the role as Photographer Manager and Sheila Stubbs was welcomed in September as our in-house bookkeeper. Philippa Horn took up Operations and Marketing. New team members include ten new WotOpera Project Assistants and Music Directors, Fanfare's mentor composer and five genre leaders for Remix plus volunteers and one intern. Many of the current staff have further taken on new roles within the projects and stepped up brilliantly.



From WotOpera Artistic Director Murray Dahm

In 2014, WotOpera created 32 operas with a little under 700 young people around the country. We surpassed the number of 100 operas created (with over 2,000 young people) since WotOpera began in 2008. The continuing growth of WotOpera is due to the wonderful people we have discovered and nurtured through the program and 2014 has seen leaps forward in the development of our team. Our relationship with UTAS has seen more students enrolling through both the High School and Camp programs. I was appointed as an Adjunct Senior Lecturer in Music at the UTAS in July ensuring that students can be assessed for their participation and engagement in the programs.

WotOpera High School Program

The **Hobart** project got the year off to a fabulous start. Three new schools and one return school or 'partner school' and all have expressed a desire to work again in the future. New Project Assistant Kate Walder was a great addition to the team.

The **Sydney** project also saw three new schools and one partner school. David Hidden stepped up as Project Assistant and Stage Manager.

The Launceston project was led by Peter Aoun. With an amazing team he fulfilled this role admirably and the schools and each school had a full experience. All four schools have confirmed their desire to be partner in the future.

The **Rockhampton** project had three schools and was led by Katrina Christensen. She was assisted by three new Project Assistants - Maddi Twidale, Jamie Langford and Patty Dunn. Rockhampton HS utilised Saturday's as one of their days and this worked well.

The Launceston B project saw two partner schools joined by one new school - Launceston Church Grammar. The project saw the introduction of three new team members - Project Assistant Dani Barnett and Music Directors Travis Hennessy and Craig Wood. All three were spectacular and great additions to the team.



The **Brisbane** project was led by Peter Aoun and Katrina Christensen with new Project Assistant Keara Donohoe. This was our first visit in Brisbane and the four schools - Calamvale, Macgregor, Canterbury College and Brisbane Girls Grammar all had a full experience and challenges were met well by the team.

The **Hobart B** project was led by Eddie Muliaumaseali'i as Project Leader and a new Music Director Joe Richards. This project consisted of three return schools and one new school.

The **Melbourne** project saw new school Mac.Robertson Girls HS join partner three partner schools. This project was a co-led by Stephanie Acraman and myself. All schools had a full experience and have confirmed their desire to be partner schools.

WotOpera Camp

We had 44 enrolments for the camp this year and it has been great to see the camp grow and build in numbers. The camp outcomes in every respect were exemplary - student, artistic, professional development, and this camp will set the bar for the future. Many students have expressed a desire to return in 2015 and with numbers of enrolments being 18 returns and 26 new students - it looks like a very healthy situation for the future.

From Remix Artistic Director Lyle Chan

In 2014, Artology Remix partnered with Opera Queensland - one of four federally-funded opera companies in Australia - to give Brisbane youth the opportunity for the first time to participate in this unique program.

A team of 28 talented young artists and 7 professionals reinvented Frankenstein, Mary Shelley's gothic novel, into a daring new stage adventure told through today's artforms of physical theatre, music, video and drama. The young artists reimagined the Frankenstein story to reflect how we create monsters in today's society, eg. by rejecting people who are different from 'us', or child neglect and created a multi-layered show told cleverly as a courtroom drama.



The work received two performances at the Opera Q Studio on Saturday 4 October 2014, coupled with very lively and probing question-&-answer sessions with the audience.Of 33 interested young artists, 28 were eventually involved in the program. They were aged 12 to 21, enrolled through a call-for-applications via Brisbane arts organisations and educational institutions.

Seven professional artists with strong credentials were enlisted to be Genre Leaders [mentors]: Lyle Chan (Artistic Director & Music), Darcy Grant (Director & Physical Theatre), Chris Kohn (Development Director & Theatre), Eleanor J Jackson (Poetry & Writing), Freddy Komp (Video), Cienda MacNamara (Drama Coach), Rachael Edwards (Production Manager).

The work was made over two creative periods in April and September. Throughout the process, the young artists were treated as if they were professionals and given real-life opportunities to have professional experiences. For instance, several of the young artists participated in publicity interviews on ABC Radio and 4ZZZ community radio.

The Frankenstein show is currently being promoted to festivals such as Queensland Music Festival to secure a further season or a tour. A major musical item from the show is also being recorded in a commercial studio, again with the aim of giving the young artists an experience just like a professional's.







Comments from WotOpera school visits

WotOpera High School invites 20 students to work with WotOpera professionals to create an opera meaningful to their lives. Students write the plot, compose the music and design the sets in a series of workshops. The program runs eight projects each year and each project is run over four weeks in a particular region with four participating schools. Three creative staff from WotOpera visit each school for four sessions totally 20 contact hours. The schools present a combined performance of their works at a professional venue in front of peers, parents and the public.

Artology Remix: The Frankenstein Project

Artology Remix is a youth creativity project that gives young people the opportunity to create a professional-quality work alongside professional artists.

This year, Artology Remix has partnered with Opera Queensland to create a new multi-genre performance work based on Mary Shelley's classic novel, Frankenstein.

We hope that the new work, made in a 15-day creative process, will endure and receive many future performances.

Mary Shelley was 19, around the same age as these young artists, when she wrote this groundbreaking novel.

In this production, the young artists have reimagined the Frankenstein story to reflect today's society, considering whether our rejection of those who are different from us, or 'the other', creates monsters of ourselves. In this way, the young artists add their voices to the classic debate of whether good and evil are inherent qualities in a person, or whether the circumstances in which we are formed determine our destinies.

Fanfare

The Fanfare competition sees the traditional Sydney Opera House cue bells that call patrons to their seats replaced by fanfares composed by some of Australia's youngest and most talented composers. The Fanfare concept was created by London's Royal Opera House in 2009, and has been brought to Australia by Artology, in association with the Sydney Opera House and the Australian Youth Orchestra. Artology's guest composer/mentor is Nicholas Vines.

Lyle Chan at age 1, Lyle Chan was already doing impressions of Edvard Munch's The Scream. It launched a stellar career in the kindergarten arts, including an acting role as a town councillor in the Pied Piper of Hamelin, and playing the Lone Ranger TV theme on the piano using only one hand. Over his adult life. he earned a Bachelor of Physics, worked as a molecular biologist, an AIDS activist and even a neurolinguistic coach and hypnotist. In music. he spent 10 years working for ABC Classics. Today, Lyle is an acclaimed composer whose works have been performed by the likes of soprano Tarvn Fiebig, flautist Jane Rutter. pianist Simon Tedeschi and even the Hon. Bob Carr. Australia's Foreign Minister.

Nicholas Vines' is an Australian composer particularly active in the US and at home. His music has been performed in Australia, USA, UK, Europe and Japan. Formerly a lecturer in music at Harvard University and at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Vines has also worked in various capacities at Wellesley College, the University of Sydney and the Australian International Conservatorium. He recently took up the position of Artistic Director of Music at Sydney Grammar School. Vines is regularly

Dani has just completed an arts degree with a focus on theatre, directing and voice at the University of Tasmania. Since the completion of her degree she has been thrilled to be

working on numerous exciting arts based projects, and to be part of the WotOpera team, where she can put all of her passions to work helping young people to express themselves in a way like no other.

Katrina Christensen studied voice and piano at the Queensland Conservatorium. After volunteering to teach her daughters primary school choir 10 years ago, she has never left the role of teaching. Katrina teachers voice and piano at several schools and privately within Rockhampton. Her students range in age from 3 to 83. Her love of music and her passion for sharing it and for performing are what drive her and will keep her teaching for years to come.

Keara Donohoe made her debut at Winmalee Primary School as the evil witch in Hansel and Gretel, Keara fell in love with singing. Keara Shenzo Gregorio is currently the only stunt violinist in the world, he has performed his unusual and daring act across Australia, Asia, India, the Middle East and Europe and continues to wow audiences to this very day, sometimes suspended up to 28 metres high from various famous landmarks, such as the Queen Victoria Building in Sydney. Apart from dangling from great heights he's also a multi-award winning musician, An Aria, Golden Fiddle Award and best of the Adelaide Fringe award recipient. Constantly in demand across the country, Shenzo freelances with many different bands as well as music directing and composing.

Travis Hennessy has a degree in Contemporary Arts (Theatre) and has had extensive training in both classical and contemporary voice and

He has been a regular company member with Opera Australia's regional touring wing, OZopera since 1999 and in 2012, became Opera Australia's most travelled singer. Ten tours, over 350 performances and 300 plus kilometres plus kilometres journeyed around Australia. He also is in charge of the education workshops on Ozopera tours. Eddie has been involved with WotOpera since 2010.

Kate Walder first graced the stage as a fairy. Although her performance was not particularly noted, this lit the flame to pursue her love of the performing arts. She graduate from the Western a keen interest in early jazz, electronica and traditional composition. He has performed with Hobart jazz bands The Cakewalking Babies, The Salamanca Jazz Band and Saucy Jack and his Ripper Band. Joseph has composed music for several short films and has been commissioned for various organisations. He currently performs with progressive rock band Celestial Circus and Catweazle as well as performing solo.

Financial and Business Report

This year an HR Audit by wattsnext was conducted from July 2014 and will continue until February 2015, with the idea that Artology would be the test-case for other entities under the Graeme Wood Group to also undergo HR support. The Artology audit was extremely useful and has helped clarify the purpose of the organisation and put in place better business structures. We now have living breathing documents that ensures staff have a clearer understanding of their roles and that of the organisations' and other staff members.

Artology is mostly funded philanthropically with some income from participating schools, students and box office income. New sources of income need to be found for the organisation long-term sustainability.



WotOpera High School program costs approximately \$1,000 per student; WotOpera Camp costs approximately \$1,500 per student; Artology Remix costs approximately \$4,000 per student and Fanfare costs \$500 per student.

Artology introduced a fee of \$4,000 per school in 2013 for the WotOpera High School program, and although this has been widely accepted, many of the low socio-economic schools and some middle-range schools were unable to cover the cost. The WotOpera Camp fee of \$500 is generally accepted and sets a good precedence for young people. That is to try and earn this money where they can in order to attend. For example a number of students fundraised a few hundred dollars and either their school or Artology contributed the remainder by offering part or full-scholarships.

Remix is an expensive project for the number of students participating. However, the program is extremely rewarding for the artists and 2015 will see the production of a commercial recording of their 2014 Frankenstein work.

Fanfare is a joint collaboration with our friends, the Australian Youth Orchestra and the Sydney Opera House. The project is very financially friendly (at a budget of \$30,000) with in-kind support from AYO and others that helped make the impact of this exciting new initiative. We are looking towards building this with other venues and areas in 2015 and internationally.
